A family history:

BANKS-HARTLEY FAMILY

[Written and donated to the Society's Genealogy section by Grayson Hartley]

It was a foggy misty May 5, 1914 on the Mersey River when Henry Banks, 55, his wife, Sarah Wooding Banks, 56, their daughter, Martha, 24, and the family friend, William Hartley, 24, boarded the passenger ship ARABIC in Liverpool, England for their voyage across the Atlantic to Portland, Maine. Their plan was to visit Henry's son, William, who had migrated to Canada in 1910 with his wife Elizabeth and son William Henry and moved to Westbrook in 1912.

William [Banks] and his family made his home at 300 Park Road, Westbrook, until his death in 1949. Upon his arrival in Westbrook, he found

employment at S.D. Warren. In the 1916 strike he took an active part. After his employment in the mill, he worked as an oil delivery man for Paulsen's Garage, later Marsters' Chevrolet Garage.

During World War II he worked at the South Portland shipyard and after the war until his retirement, at Southworth Machine Shop on Warren Avenue, Portland. During World War I William served in the Canadian Army. William and Elizabeth Banks had three children; William Henry, Ethel Lavina, and Emily Banks Chretien.

Henry and Sarah, during their two-year stay in Westbrook, lived on Power's Hill, Cumberland Street with their daughter Martha and William Hartley, before returning to England in 1916.

Martha Banks and William Hartley lived with Martha's brother, William and family until their marriage in 1918, when William H. entered the Army. Following his service time William and Martha both worked at S.D. Warren and made their home on Brown Street and later on Forest Street where their twin children, Florence and Grayson, were born in 1931. Later they made their home on Rochester Street.

William Hartley worked at S.D. Warren until his death in 1944. He served in the Westbrook Fire Department and died from injuries he received when the chimney collapsed on him while fighting a fire at the Phillips farm on Spring Street and County Road (where Eisenhower Drive is now located). During over 100 years since the founding of the Fire Department, he is the only fireman to die from injuries sustained while fighting a fire.

Martha Hartley continued to make her home on Rochester Street until her death in 1975.

W. PAULSEN CHEVROLET CO.

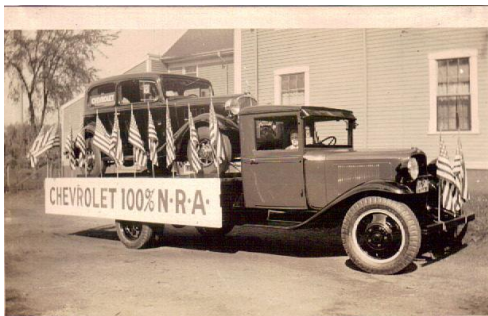
Many people are familiar with Marsters Motors at 511 Main St. but many have forgotten – or never knew – that the building and car business actually began with a prior owner, Walter Paulsen, and was known as “W. Paulsen Chevrolet Co.”

The building was built by Walter Paulsen, (my grandfather), and was also owned and operated by him. I am not sure when he started the business. Prior to this car business he was a housing contractor and built many houses in Westbrook and the surrounding area.

Paulsen Chevrolet was built with an inside ramp that enabled to-be-sold cars to be driven and stored on the second floor. There were two gasoline pumps on the sidewalk.

In 1936 Walter sold his business to his brother-in-law, Harry Marsters (Sr.). I believe Uncle Harry was my Grandfather’s sales manager. While it was Paulsen Chevrolet, I believe the Marsters family ran

a little restaurant/coffee shop connected with the building.

In recent times the building was owned by Aubuchon Hardware and it now contains a furniture rental business.



A Neighborhood History:

COUNTY ROADS AT DUCK POND

[Authors unknown; this is a composite of two 1970s articles on the Duck Pond/Highland Lake roads]

The first road to be laid out in the Duck Pond area was the Bakerstown Road, now Blackstrap Road, and was surveyed by the County in 1773. The road at that time ran up over Leighton Hill and Mount Independence; at a later date it was altered to the east at the intersection of the Hardy and Blackstrap roads and resumes that same course today. The old section, the records state, was altered to avoid the steep inclines. Some of this old road is still visible today.

Another old artery through this section was the Windham Road, now the Duck Pond and Sawyer Roads and was laid out by the County in the early 1780's. A petition was received and reviewed by the General Sessions of the Peace in Oct 1783 from residents of Bridgton, Otisfield and Raymond, requesting a road from Bridgton to Falmouth, Portland. This road traveled down from Windham via the Pope, Land of Nod, Sawyer, Hardy, Duck Pond Road to Pride's Corner and across the

Presumpscot River. The Bridgton Road, Route 302, has been altered many time over the years, thus little of it passes over the old original course today.

The record of the General Sessions of the Peace states the road as passing by Joshua Lowell's of Windham, across the Falmouth line and by the Easterly corner of Jonathon Sawyer's house over the Duck Pond Brook and passing one rod from the Southerly Corner of Joseph Conant's barn, East of the Twombly house and South of James Gowen's barn, passing by the northerly side of Nathaniel Hale's and down to the Presumpscot River.

It may be interesting to note the homes on Duck Pond Road that are mentioned in [the original] County Record, together with the owner's names. Passing the Duck Pond Bridge the first one mentioned was that of Joshua Woodbury, great grandfather of Lyman Woodbury, living in the home now owned by Robert and Rhoda Gordon. Then moving on one comes to the James Gowen two-story house, it being the second beyond Neal Brown's. James Gowen built the home during the Revolution, Gowen descendants still live on Duck Pond Road. The large early American home beyond Swainhurst was built by Nathaniel Hale whose home in Portland was burned in the British bombardment. He was the great grandfather of our neighbor on Craig Road, Leon Hale.
