THE MUSEUM CORNER

William W. Poole, Jr., born September 10, 1889, was Vice President of the Westbrook High School class of 1908. The 1908 Blue & White gave the following statistics: "William Whipple Poole, Jr. – Yes, that's his name. The one with the expansive grin. He is another who believes in taking life easy. A lady's man as may be seen anytime..."

William was the son of Mr. & Mrs. William W. Poole and his father was the President of the Haskell Silk Mill. After high school he entered Dartmouth College and was prominent in various activities there. Following his graduation in 1912 he entered into the paper manufacturing business, first at West Virginia Pulp and Paper in WV, then at Maine Coated Paper Co. in Rumford, ME where he met his bride-to-be. In 1916 he joined the Bryant Paper Co. in Kalamazoo, Mich. On June 20, 1917 William married Delia Florence McPhee in Rumford and they moved to Kalamazoo where they lived until April 27, 1918 when events in WW I caused William to enlist in the Army.

Within three months of his basic training at Camp Custer in Michigan, Private Poole was sent to France with the 329th Machine Gun Battalion. He then transferred to the 165th Infantry of the Rainbow Division. On September 12, 1918, his unit went into action in the St. Michiel offensive.

According to a letter sent to Dartmouth College by his father, William was "instantly killed in battle by machine gun fire...in the drive at St. Michiel while advancing with his Company in the attack made that day. His burial place is on the north side of the ridge between Seichprey and St. Baussant, a few miles north of Toul."

A few months ago the Society received a set of 9 books of Shakespeare's plays, a gift from Allen & Pamela Cote of Augusta. Pamela is the niece of Delia McPhee Poole and found the books after Delia's death.

Although the Library & Museum Committee usually limits their assessments to Westbrook-related items, we could not refuse these small, annotated books when we learned of their history and saw the documentation of W. W. Poole, Jr.'s life....so we are happy to say that a piece of William has returned to his home!

THE 'OTHER' WESTBROOK

Ever wonder why Westbrook, CT was named Westbrook? Well some of the Tuesday Society workers wondered and they sent a query off to that historical society. The answer, kindly given by Margaret Buckridge Bock, was that "Saybrook Colony was originally composed of the present towns of Old Saybrook, Essex, Westbrook, Deep River and part of Lyme. Westbrook (also known by the Indian name of Pochaug) was the West Parish of the colony. When it separated to form its own church, it was called West Saybrook, the "Say" soon being dropped."

Along with this information, Margaret sent a copy of a photo of the Westbrook Cornet Band, which she said they knew was not a group from their city; they wondered if the band 'belonged' to us. After a search on www.books.goggle.com, it was discovered (in an 1885-86 Maine Register) that this was indeed one of our bands. It was lead by Howard S. Babb and was located in Cumberland Mills.

This only shows that there is a lot of information still to be learned by our Societies...if we continue to ask the questions!

TID-BIT FROM A LOCAL NEWSPAPER OCTOBER 1893

In past Newsletters we have highlighted some Westbrook people who have made a mark on history.

Henry Plummer (or Plumer), the Montana outlaw who appeared in the Summer 08 Newsletter, is currently being researched for a forthcoming book on his life. Society workers had the opportunity to assist the future author with some research at our library.

Artt Frank, Bop Drummer who appeared in Winter 09, was inducted into the Oklahoma Jazz Hall of Fame in Tulsa on November 16, 2010. Congratulations, Artt!

Here are some other local **MEN OF NOTE**:

Edmund Needham Morrill (1834 – 1909)

Born to Rufus and Mary Webb Morrill on February 12, 1834 in Saccarappa, Edmund Needham Morrill attended Westbrook schools and Westbrook Seminary. Following school he worked in town with his father who taught him the trade of tanning.



In 1857 Edmund joined a colony which left Maine to found a new settlement in the territory of Kansas. They laid out a town called Hamlin, in honor of Hannibal Hamlin who was then a senator from Maine. Edmund bought land for \$1.25 an acre and, with supplies brought from Maine, he started a saw mill. He was only 23.

His new career was soon cut short by two events, a fire that burned his mill to the ground and the advent of the Civil War. In 1861 he enlisted in Company C, 7th Kansas Cavalry. Within a year he was promoted to captain and by 1865 was made a major. He served with General Grant at Corinth.

He married Elizabeth Bretton of Livermore, ME in 1862. Following her death in 1868 he married Caroline Nash of Boston and settled in Hiawatha, KS where they raised three children.

Following the war Edmund entered into the banking business where he remained for the rest of his life, helping to establish the first bank in Brown County in 1871.

Edmund's political career began in 1866 when he was elected clerk of the district court; it continued upward to the U.S. Congress where he served his adopted state for eight years. In 1894, he accepted the republican nomination for Governor and served as the 13th Governor of Kansas from January 14, 1893 to January 11, 1897.

Following his defeat for a second gubernatorial term, Edmund dedicated himself to his business and to philanthropic ventures that benefited the citizens of his hometown of Hiawatha, Kansas. In 1882 he initiated funds for the Morrill Free Library which he later deeded to the city. He also donated land and money to establish the Hiawatha Academy for boys and girls.

Edmund died March 14, 1909 and is buried in the Mount Hope Cemetery in Hiawatha, KS. He is remembered for his sincerity and honesty and his earnestness and progressiveness of ideals. He is also remembered by a tiny town northeast of Hiawatha, near the town of Hamlin, which was named Morrill in his honor.

Harrison King McCann (1880 – 1962)

Harrison King McCann was born in Saccarappa on November 4, 1880, a descendent of the Cloudmans of Presumpscot Lower falls. His parents were Joseph and Ella Mary Bean McCann. Although his name is well known today in the business world, it would be recognized by few Westbrook residents. He graduated from Westbrook High School in 1898 and from Bowdoin College class of 1902.

He started his business career working for a well known hotel proprietor in New York City. He moved on to become advertising manager for the New York Telephone Company and then he took the same position for Standard Oil Co. in 1911. When that company was dissolved by the Supreme Court later that year Harrison started his own advertising agency with \$5,000 borrowed money.

He organized and incorporated the H.K.

McCann Co. as a general advertising business. It became the Standard Oil Company's spin-off advertising department and soon added new clients such as General Motors and Coca-Cola. The business thrived and extended all over the US and into Canada.



In 1912 Harrison introduced the 'total marketing' concept, moving the agency into

disciplines such as public relations, sales promotion and production survey services.

The depression led to a company merger with Albert Erickson's smaller agency to form the McCann-Erickson Agency. Harrison lived to see that organization become the first to approach the half-million dollar mark. In 1928 McCann-Erickson established three offices in Europe and grew to have branches in 44 countries.

Harrison is thought to have been the first to hire a psychological research staff and his vision lead his company to vast achievements in advertising. His vision and life long work for better principles and practices in advertising are among his most notable legacies.

Today McCann-Erickson is one of the world's largest agency networks; its client list included BASK, Cathay Pacific, Chrysler, Coca-Cola, Exxon Mobil, GM, Johnson & Johnson, MasterCard, Microsoft and Sony.

Erickson died in 1962.

Lt. Col. Robert C. Knight, (1939 -)

LTC Robert C. Knight, USA, Ret., is the son of the late Forrest and Annie McClure Knight and the brother of Society member Bette Bragdon.

He attended Westbrook schools and currently has a Masters Degree in Military Art and Science from the Command and General Staff College, Leavenworth, KS.

Colonel Knight enlisted in the Maine National Guard in 1955 at the age of 16 and enlisted for active duty in April 1956. In December 1960 he received his Commission as a Lieutenant from Infantry Officer Candidate School, Fort Benning, GA. Following OCS he completed helicopter and fixed wing flight training at Fort Rucker, AL.



He served two tours in Vietnam. He was wounded after being shot down in his helicopter in 1966 and was medically evacuated after serving there for ten months. He returned to Vietnam in 1967 and served as an armed helicopter platoon leader. During the 1968 TET Offensive Colonel Knight was recommended for the Distinguished

Service Cross, the Nation's second highest medal for heroism. He went on to fly a total of 1495 hours of combat missions.

He was nominated for membership in the Legion of Valor of the USA in 1971 by General George S. Patton, Jr. Membership is restricted to those awarded the Medal of Honor or one of the three second highest crosses for extraordinary heroism. Colonel Knight was elected National Commander for the Legion of Valor for the year 2006-2007.

He retired from the military with 30 years service on November 1, 1984.

Among his many awards are: Distinguished Service Cross, 5 Distinguished Flying Crosses, 2 Bronze Stars for Valor, 3 Purple Hearts, 62 Air Medals with Valor Device, Army Commendation Medal with Valor Device, Meritorious Service Medal, Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry plus other overseas medals and service ribbons. One of his uniforms and some of his military medals are on display at the Society along with a photo taken at the White House with the President and Mrs. George W. Bush.

He now resides in Melbourne, FL with his wife Drucilla.
